As a regional educational association, **Artes Liberales** sponsors regular professional exchanges and other collaborative programs to promote liberal education and democratic leadership among scholars and institutions of higher learning in post-communist countries. **Artes Liberales** encourages colleges and universities to adopt innovative liberal arts curricula as a counter-weight to the premature and often excessive specialization typical of communist and post-communist pedagogy. **Artes Liberales** is actively engaged in expanding cooperative ties with other liberal arts institutions, both in the region and in the United States.

THE EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Liberales

The Educational Leadership Program was created in 1984 by The Christian A. Johnson Endeavor Foundation. The chief aim of the program is to improve liberal education by providing academic leaders of both secondary and post-secondary schools with a continuing opportunity to develop their leadership skills, to renew their institutional mission, and to reflect upon the social value of liberal education. To this end, the Leadership Program conducts its own projects, sponsors research, and offers advice to participating institutions.

For the last fifteen years, the Leadership Program's major activity has been a series of seminars aimed at regenerating the intellectual and leadership capacities of colleges, schools and universities. Selected groups of up to fifteen educational professionals and their spouses are brought together throughout the year to spend a week engaging in discussions aimed at intellectual renewal. Among others, the issues addressed in these seminars have included: the renewal of institutional vision, maintaining and expanding intellectual confidence, and understanding the role of educational leadership. To date, the participants in this program have represented more than 500 schools and colleges.

The Educational Leadership Program also sponsors occasional papers and research projects on educational leadership issues, which then serve as the basis for short conferences. Throughout, the program collaborates with other organizations to develop programs which promote the value of liberal education. After a 1996 conference held in Budapest, Hungary, whose purpose was to explore the opportunities for liberal education in the post-communist countries of East and Central Europe, the Leadership Program has established a cooperative partnership with the newly founded **Artes Liberales**.

The Foundation sponsored a meeting of the **Artes Liberales** steering committee in Krakow in July 1997, to enable it to prepare for its 1998 conference and to work out other details about the organization's purpose and activities. This meeting coincided with the annual meeting of the International Society of Political Psychology, at which **Artes Liberales** committee members participated on a panel on the value of reconstituting liberal education.

The **Foundation** has set up a website for **Artes Liberales** to enable it to publicize its program an announce new initiatives. The Foundation is also currently preparing a new program for the coming year, the International Visiting Professorships in Liberal Education. Under this initiative, selected educators from Central Europe will be awarded fellowships at institutions in other countries of the region and in the United States, so that they may both benefit from and contribute to a frutiful exchange of pedagogical, curricular, and intellectual knowledge.
